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AllSides and More Like US Announce Similarity Hub Tool to Address Toxic Polarization

Similarity Hub reveals common ground and corrects political misperceptions among Americans

DENVER, COLORADO — AllSides and More Like US announce the launch of <u>Similarity Hub</u>, a tool that reveals policy overlaps between Democrats and Republicans and points of agreement on political issues among supermajorities of Americans.

The collaboration between AllSides, a provider of balanced news and 1,400 Media Bias Ratings™, and More Like US, a nonprofit that shows overlaps between Americans across the political spectrum starting with secondary education, shows Americans are actually more similar to each other across the political spectrum than is often believed, revealing opportunities for political progress.

Similarity Hub showcases more than 200 policy questions across 20 hot-button issue areas in which majorities of Americans agree, including topics such as abortion, immigration, elections, and media bias.

"Politicians and news media on both sides mislead us into thinking that there is no common ground and that the other side is radically different from us," said John Gable, cofounder and CEO of AllSides Technologies, Inc. "That is just wrong. By showcasing how much we agree, AllSides and More Like US combat misinformation and false belief, and give us all the ability to better understand reality and come together to solve problems."

"Similarity Hub shows we Americans are more similar across politics than we think. Policy overlaps exist on every major hot-button topic," said James Coan, co-founder and Executive Director of More Like US. "We have less to fear about the 'other side,' and more opportunities for successfully communicating and working together."

Similarity Hub can help close the <u>"Perception Gap"</u> among Americans. <u>The Perception Gap was coined from a study</u> that found both Democrats and Republicans, to roughly similar degrees,

think those in the other party are more politically extreme than they really are. The Perception Gap is dangerous because it can feed into an idea that "our side" must "win at all costs," even leading to actions that put the country's democratic republic and/or safety at risk. Correcting the Perception Gap has been found to be effective, as it accounted for the majority of the best-performing interventions that reduced anti-democratic attitudes, partisan animosity and support for political violence in the <u>Strengthening Democracy Challenge</u> from Stanford.

Yet common ground is everywhere, across all hot-button topics. For instance, Americans have a balanced view of energy issues. In 2022, a survey from Gallup <u>found</u> more than three-quarters of both Republicans and Democrats favored "tax credits to Americans who install clean energy systems like solar power in their homes." Yet Americans realize no transition can happen overnight, as a 2023 Pew Research Center survey <u>found</u> a majority of those in each party said "the U.S. should use a mix of fossil fuels and renewables."
